New College Access Grant Added to CAP

The U.S. Department of Education has awarded a \$2.2 million Rural Postsecondary Economic Development (RPED) grant to College Access Partnerships (CAP) at Appalachian State University. The program entitled *On Ramp Appalachia* will work to help students make the transition from high school to community college.

The scope of the grant includes four community college partners and their corresponding school districts currently affiliated with Appalachian GEAR UP and Appalachian State University Public School Partnership and will serve nearly 2,000 rural students in 11th grade through their sophomore year of college. MyFutureNC, Participate Learning, The Hunt Institute, and the High Country Workforce Development Board serve as ongoing advisors and will support the mission of the project.

On Ramp aims to promote increased access to postsecondary education and workforce development particularly for students in rural areas, helping students who do not have college and career plans to identify their pathway to college and careers, and increasing college graduation rates.

Director of CAP Operations and Appalachian GEAR UP, Corinne Smith says, "This grant was a very intentional step toward our vision of bringing more resources to the students of western North Carolina to improve educational outcomes. We are thrilled to support the community colleges in the area, recognizing their pivotal role in postsecondary access and as catalysts of economic development in our communities."

GEAR UP Assistant Director for Higher Education Partnerships, Adam Warren will lead the grant, and the program will launch this Spring. More information about *On Ramp* will be released later this semester.

ISSDL Symposium

Earlier this year, ETL Navigators presented at the 37th International Society for Self-Directed Learning (ISSDL) Symposium. Our paper presentation, "Exploring Teachers' Initial Perceptions of Self-Directed Learning within a Teacher-Directed Professional Learning Program," was a qualitative analysis of teachers' responses to self-directed learning as it pertains to goal-setting. This research was led by Dr. Nelson.

We are thrilled to inform you that the presentation was very well-received and followed by an engaging discussion with fellow educators and researchers. This provided an invaluable opportunity for us to immerse ourselves in the latest research and developments in the field of self-directed learning. We came back inspired and ready to apply new insights to our ongoing work!

We plan to submit our paper for publication in the ISSDL Journal and look forward to sharing updates soon. We are grateful for the support of CAP in allowing us to share what we are learning as we continue working with our wonderful teacher-participants!

College Advising Corps

Appalachian State University

CAC Summit in San Diego

In December, advisers and program staff attended the CAC Summit in San Diego, CA. This three-day summit gave our team the opportunity to share best practices and network with the 800+ advisers and program staff in the country. Our very own Geneva Watson and Kenley Jackson presented on the national stage and represented AppCAC well!

VolunteerNC LeaderCorps

In January, Geneva Watson and Ashley Bingman, who serves as the AppCAC representatives in VolunteerNC's Leader Corps group, attended a training at Montreat College. They assisted with the facilitation of the program staff workshops, completed a service project, and had the opportunity to network with LeaderCorps representatives from programs across the state.

KPI Highlights

- An average of 36% family engagement across our program (compared to 21% national average)
- Advisers have met with an average of 70% of their seniors on a one-to-one basis
- An average of 40% of seniors across the program have submitted at least one college application
- On average, advisers have assisted 30% of their seniors with the FAFSA



Upward Bound hosted a Weekend Academy

11th grade students sat for a timed practice ACT exam, while 12th graders completed the FAFSA, applied for scholarships, and shared their most recent college acceptances. Students have been accepted to App State, UNC Greensboro, Chapel Hill, Asheville, ECU, Warren Wilson, Montreat, NC State, and Lees McRae (among others). One student is eagerly awaiting his interview with an Admissions representative from Harvard! The UB 12th grade class has worked incredibly hard over the past few months!





YES Class of 2024

The YES Class of 2024 has worked hard throughout the college application season and continues to do so and are starting to hear back from schools! Of the twelve graduating seniors, eight have been accepted to at least one school and one has chosen to pursue a career education program for dental assisting. Acceptances include App State, Berea College, Columbia (our first QuestBridge match!), Drexel, Elon University, ETSU, Guilford College, Lehigh University, Meredith, Salem College, UNC Asheville, UNC Charlotte, and UNC Wilmington. We couldn't be more thrilled as students discern which opportunity will be their next place to grow and thrive.

After School in Ashe County

Starting in February, Ashe County middle school YES families took up our offer to meet their scholars at Ashe County High School for after school sessions every Thursday from 3:45-5:45 pm. High school and early college students are invited as well. We're using this time to help scholars strengthen organizational and study skills and have a little fun! It's been great to have siblings together and friendships developing within the YES family. We're excited to do this in March and April, too!
